


Flag Duty & Scout Etiquette

- Most colorful part of your duties on Mackinac Island
 - Job requires respect and discipline
- Correct formal flag procedures MUST be performed
 - Flag duty and marching performance will be closely monitored and evaluated by the Scout Coordinator
 - The Troop must be able to march in unison and raise and lower the flags sharply and in synchronized harmony











Scout Etiquette cont.

- ALWAYS march to and from flag stations
- Horses have the right-of-way
 - When encountering any horse, stop marching
 - Move to the side and remain silent and still until the horse passes
 - Always look away from an oncoming horse
- Allow extra time to arrive at your flag station on time
















 - Fort Main Flag Pole
 3 Different Flags
 Weather Conditions dictate
 flag to be flown










- Fort Mackinac Detail
 - 1 Main Flag Pole
 - 3 Different Flags, flown based on weather conditions
 - o Garrison (20'x 36', 38 Star Flag)
 - Fort Main (10' x15', 38 Star Flag)
 - Fort Storm (4'x8', 38 Star Flag)
 - When the Main or Storm Flags are flown, ropes shall be wrapped around the pole before tying to prevent ropes from hitting the pole









Garrison Flag

- Flown only in excellent weather conditions
- Special care must be taken, especially around nearby trees
- Six Scouts required for raising and lowering
- Sixteen Scouts are required for folding done in the parade grounds











Garrison Flag cont.


- Flag should be changed to suit weather conditions
- Always protect from rain and winds
- Better to lower flag on false alarms to ensure no damage to flag
- Special care must be taken, especially around nearby trees

— Any question on which flag to fly, consult the Scout

Coordinator











Fort Main Flag

- Flown on normal weather days
- Four to Six Scouts required for raising and lowering
- Folding done in the parade grounds
- Any question on which Fort Main flag to fly, consult the Scout Coordinator

Fort Storm Flag

Flown on windy, rainy, or when threatening weather is predicted







 - 1707-1801 British Union
 - British Red Ensign
 - British Union
 - Star- Spangled Banner
 - 1895 American Flag 44 Stars
 - State of Michigan
 - American 50
















- Avenue of Flags
 - 8 Different Flags




- 4 Right Side from road to fort

Flag Duty Details

General

- All flags will be flown when Fort is open
- Some Evening Events may require flags to stay up during evening hours
- Flags must be raised and lowered by Scouts
- Only American flags and the Star-Spangled Banners are to be folded in the triangular shape
- All others are folded rectangularly













Flag Duty Details

Scouts Barracks

- Troop raises and lowers the Scout Barrack flags with the entire troop
- Ceremony starts promptly at 8:50 A.M.
- Flag lowering is at 6:50 P.M.
- Troop announcements shall be performed immediately after flag raising and lowering













Flag Duty Details

- Morning Flag Raising
 - An automatic bugle recording of "Reveille" will start immediately at 9:30 A.M
 - All Scouts should come to attention and raise flags briskly at the first note of Reveille and the sound of cannon
 - Flags must be raised uniformly and synchronized















Morning Flag Raising cont.

- When "Reveille" is completed, the bugler will play "To the Colors"
- Scouts will hold salute from the beginning of "Reveille" to the completion of "To the Colors"

Flags MUST reach the top of the poles simultaneously.














Flag Duty Details cont.

- Evening Retreat and Flag Lowering
 - An automatic bugle recording of "Retreat" will play twice at 6:30 P.M.
 - All Scouts should remain at parade rest throughout Retreat













Evening Retreat cont.

- The Scout Cannoneer will fire a single gun salute
- Bugler will play "To the Colors" after gun salute
- Flags will descend respectfully, reaching the bottom of the poles as the bugler finishes
- Flags Downtown will be lowered at 6:30 along with all other flags















Flag Raising/Lowering Details

- All flags <u>MUST</u> be raised and lowered in unison on the Ramp and on the Avenue
- Flags going up are raised quickly
- Flags going down are lowered slowly
- One flag on the Ramp and one flag on the Avenue shall be selected as the guide flag
- The guide flag shall be watched and used to time all other flags for raising and lowering in unison
- Two scouts shall handle the halyards (ropes) when raising and lowering flags
 - One Scout will raise and lower the flag, the other scout will act as a brakeman to control the speed of the flag as necessary to stay in unison with the guide flag.
 - This takes some practice to get it right









Half Staff Procedure



Post Cemetery

- Post Cemetery flag is always flown at half staff.
- First raise the flag to the top of the pole
- Pause for a three second salute, then respectfully lower the flag 1/3 the length of the pole
- Flag should be equal distance from the top and bottom of the pole
- To lower a half staff flag, the procedure is reversed









Half Staff Procedure cont.

Fort Main

- First raise the flag to the top of the pole
- Pause for a three second salute, then respectfully lower the flag 1/4 the length of the pole
- Flag should be lowered just above cedar trees
- To lower a half staff flag, the procedure is reversed
- The MSHP and Scout Coordinator will inform troop when flags are to be flown half staff
- Fort Main, Governor's, Scout Barracks, downtown buildings, Mackinac Art Museum, and the two flags at the bottom of South Sally ramp are only flags to be lowered







Cannoneer

- Troop 168 Adult will handle and fire signal cannon (morning signal)
- Troop's Cannoneer will be trained
 Will have signed cannon procedure provided by Scout Coordinator
- Cannoneer will be at each flag raising and retreat
- Cannoneer will fire cannon each evening
- The Cannoneer and Scout Leader ensure the cannon receives the respect as a lethal weapon











Conclusion

- Honor Guard Duty is a prestigious responsibility
- Procedures must be uniform and synchronized
- Treat the duty with respect at all times
